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This has been an interesting year as we have made progress in some areas, yet have been

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44 45 46 stymied in accomplishing some of our goals. Our goals from last year were carried through, but with much different results.

- 1. To compile and maintain a list of college students from our conference to ensure connection with the local Wesley Foundation or United Methodist Church. In 2012 we were aided by the Charge Conference reports that required each church to submit a list of college students, where they were attending, their addresses, and a way to contact them while on campus. However, although the discipline still requires such reports to be submitted to the charge conference and to the Conference Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry, the report was purposely omitted from the Charge conference forms distributed by the District Superintendents, and thus the information was not gathered. The rationale that was given was that by the time the Charge Conferences are held and the reports compiled, the students are well into the semester and have passed the 48 hour window that was discussed at Annual Conference last year. With that in mind, it was suggested the push for names comes earlier, around the time of Annual Conference and not Charge Conference (while the report should still be included in the Charge Conference report as per the Discipline). So while we were not able to compile a new list, it is our hope that we will accomplish it in the next year, by starting before Annual Conference.
- 2. To compile a list of Churches within our Annual Conference who support higher education by giving scholarships. We continue to promote this internally, yet have not done an adequate job of getting this request or clarifying this for the Annual Conference. We hope to select a member of our Board as the point-person for this data, and then work to help each church celebrate the way they contribute to Higher Education at next year's Annual Conference.
- 3. To help Wesley Foundations in their ministry to students. We have only received a few requests for help, most of those involving leadership events and transportation costs, but we continue to put the highest emphasis on making a difference while our students are at college, not simply getting them to college.
- 4. To encourage local churches to engage with the colleges in their communities and to consider beginning a Holy Club, a Wesley Foundation, a Bible Study, or a College and Young Adult Group. Several churches have already begun this practice and are making great headway. We were not able to connect with them to offer them any assistance, but remain open to possibilities, especially at the community college level.
- 5. To provide resources to local churches as they maintain connection with their students who attend college. We have sent our periodic announcements to churches, pastors and youth leaders informing them of ideas to help with their connections.

6. To seek ways to support new campus ministry efforts. No work was accomplished on this goal.

One of our major issues this year has to do with the rule changes by the General Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry regarding the Merit Scholarship. We were not permitted to request applicants to submit their forms to our Annual Conference, but required to have all scholarship applicants fill out the generic form online at GBHEM. This prompted some confusion within the conference and anxiety regarding the award, as we no longer have the control and discretion we are accustomed to having.

This led as well as the desire to give more aid to students within our conference led us to create the Annual Conference Scholarship Resolution to be voted on during this session of Annual Conference. We hope to be able to have a more direct impact on the lives of students within our conference, recognizing that a large portion of our students do not leave the bounds of this conference and do not attend a United Methodist related College or University. Our resolution will allow us to encourage these students as well, and encourage participation in Wesley Foundations while at the college of their choice.

Our goals for 2014 will continue to be the same, believing we can make substantial progress on each of these, with the help of each church, each pastor and each youth/college minister. Together we can help shape the future of the Peninsula-Delaware Conference, not simply wait to see what it becomes.

BOARD OF ORDAINED MINISTRY

The Peninsula-Delaware Annual Conference Board of Ordained Ministry has had an exciting and eventful year in 2013-14. We started the conference year off by seeing 2 colleagues commissioned as provisional elders and 5 colleagues ordained as full elders.

We held a continuing education event for pastors who were moving appointments. This workshop is always beneficial to pastors whether this is their first move or they have moved ministry setting several times.

A training for all four district committees on ordained ministry was held in June, where a revised District Committee handbook was presented.

The Supervision committee has strived to work with all of our provisional candidates who have questions and concerns regarding the next stages of their interview process.

The Conference Relations Committee has been busy caring for our colleagues in transition through retirement and leaves of absence.

The enlistment and recruitment team has been hard at work encouraging potential ministry leaders to wrestle with the call to ordained ministry in their lives. We were able to pay over \$58,000 of Ministerial Education funds to assist certified candidates working on their college and seminary degrees, local pastors attending course of study and candidates attending local pastor licensing school.

This summer a long standing dream of many conference leaders is about to become a reality. We will have our first Local Pastor's Licensing School within the bounds of our Annual Conference. This will take place at Camp Pecometh during the last week of June. Many thanks to Dr. Shirlyn Brown for her vision, persistence and leadership in making this dream come true.

In February and March, we interviewed 6 full elder candidates, 3 full deacon candidates, and 3 provisional elder candidates.

I have participated all year in the meetings and activities of the North East Jurisdiction Board of Ordained Ministry where we wrestle with denominational issues concerning ministry leadership and seek to make our processes more streamlined and effective.

I am grateful for this Board full of gifted and caring individuals who serve our conference through countless hours of reading papers, interviewing, mentoring, shepherding and holding leaders accountable. It is a job with work behind the scenes but very important work within the life of our Annual Conference. I am grateful to our Executive Board and our officers for rolling up their sleeves and tackling the hard work. I also give thanks and praise to our Cabinet and Bishop Johnson for their assistance, prayers and mentoring.

Greetings from Wesley College! In my second year as campus minister at Wesley, we continue to see growth in our campus community in regards to Spiritual Life. I am excited about the work that is taking place here on campus and the teamwork that is taking place between our campus ministry groups. As a part time campus minister, I believe that the most effective way to do my job is to empower students, faculty, and staff to create the kind of spiritual environment where members of our community can experience the transformational love and grace of Jesus Christ!

This year we have worked on developing a Spiritual Life Board on campus. This board is made up of students from our various faith based student organizations. This has become of time of strategic planning, communication, and encouragement. As we continue to meet, I expect that great things will come out of this group for our campus community.

We continue to offer monthly Praise Nights that are sponsored by my office. As before, they have featured local pastors and worship leaders, including the Wesley College Gospel Choir. These times have given my wife and I the opportunity of getting to know our students better and to offer them a "home away from home" feel. We have had between 10-15 college students at our house for these studies. It is exciting to see our students jam around our dining room table as one family for the meal and discussion. Andrea and I use this time to model what a Christian marriage and families look like as well as encouraging them in their faith.

We have three very active student organizations on campus: FCA, SWAT, and Impact. Each group has their own niche on campus and does great work. Subsequently, we followed up with each student by inviting them to an official Kick-off Meeting, which was held on September 10th. During that time, we shared our mission statement and purpose. Also, we had great fellowship and discussed the most convenient

times for Bible study and community service. Rev. Alice Johnson Ervin (Wesley Foundation

at DSU Chair) was in attendance as well, to offer our students support and to extend an official welcome.

Our Bible studies were rich and engaging. The average attendance was between 14-16 students per week. We met on Tuesdays at 7:00pm and on Thursdays at 7:00pm. I am also happy to report that we have finally secured a meeting space in the Education and Humanities Building. Now, we don't have the distractions of meeting in the lobby.

During our time together we generally eat, share our daily experiences, and study the Word of God. The students were very open about their challenges and eager to share their joys. This type of forum, gave rise to Bible studies and dialogue on racism, dealing with problems, relationship building, dating, and real worship. Our small group discussions were well received and provoked a deeper desire for our students to apply biblical principles to their everyday life.

At homecoming, Ariael Brooks Porter represented us as Miss Methodist Student Association. It was a very proud moment for us as we watched her wear a beautiful full length evening gown at the coronation. However, since the parade was cancelled, due to rain, we were unable to use our newly purchased car magnets. Nevertheless, we still have them for next year. Ariael, Miss MSA, also represented us with her praise dancing at the installation service of our Dover District Superintendent, Rev. Dr. Vicki Gordy-Stith.

The Wesley Foundation was also very active in providing financial assistance during the year. By the grace of God and the generosity of our connection, we (Whatcoat UMC-Dover, Wesley UMC-Dover, Asbury UMC-Smyrna, and Centennial UMC-Smyrna) were able to help students suffering from financial hardship. Our first opportunity to offer benevolence was to two young ladies. Unfortunately, due to loss of employment, they had fallen on hard times which prevented them from paying their rent. As a result, they were on the verge of becoming homeless. If it had not been for the financial assistance of the Wesley Foundation, these bright and highly motivated students may have had to withdraw from school. The good news is that they received their assistance and are back on track pursuing their degrees.

Shortly there-after, we were also approached by a transfer student in need of books that were not provided by his academic scholarship. Consequently, we responded by making arrangements to buy the young man's books for the entire semester. He too, is back on track and following his dreams. In addition, financial assistance was also given to MSA students attending the Young Adult Summit in Ocean City, MD.

We have also been connecting students back to the local church. Each week, Centennial and Whatcoat (Dover) have been offering DSU students with an opportunity to have a worship experience off campus. Transportation is always made available.

I would also like to give a personal thanks to Whatcoat UMC (Dover) for presenting our students with opportunities to serve the greater Dover community. Each week, students can go to Whatcoat (Monday through Thursday) to help where needed. Whether they are

working with the After School Tutoring Program, Soup Kitchen, Brown Bag, or Clothes Closet, the lesson of "giving back" is being learned. At the end of each semester, we celebrated their excellent work by having a fellowship dinner.

The Wesley Foundation also provided workshops and events that were helpful in the development of professional and spiritual leadership. Drs. Berlin and Reba Hollingsworth educated our students on parliamentary procedures and Rev. Jamar Jackson gave a separate workshop entitled "Saved, Sex, and Single." Both workshops were well attended and well received.

On April 4th, we traveled to see the play "Moses" at Sight and Sound in Lancaster, PA and were absolutely blow away by the production. The students were amazed by the story that they have read and studied since childhood. Following that event, on April 11th and 12th, we traveled to Ocean City, MD for the Young Adult Summit. This was our second year attending and each year the students have used this opportunity to grow closer to God. Arial Brooks Porter (Miss MSA and founder of I-Step) also brought her step team from DSU to participate.

The 2013-2014 academic school year was a great success. The Wesley Foundation was able to support the efforts of the Methodist Student Association with the necessary resources to develop strong spiritual leaders. WESLEY FOUNDATION CAMPUS MINISTRY SALISBURY UNIVERSITY

The Wesley Foundation at Salisbury University is a Christian fellowship campus ministry sponsored by the United Methodist Church and named for John Wesley, the founder of the Methodist movement. John Wesley believed that wherever people are in their understanding of faith, it is beneficial for them to meet together often in small groups and encourage each other along in their spiritual journey.

Wesley Foundation students are provided an environment and atmosphere conducive to study as they explore their faith and have the opportunity to be spiritually connected as they transition into their formative stage of life. Additionally, they have worked diligently to make a connection with the local church.

Wesley Foundation is a diverse campus ministry open to all, regardless of race, religious affiliation, or lack thereof. The foundation seeks to bring heart and mind together exploring every day issues of faith by reaching out to others through prayer, and compassionate

conversation. Wesley Foundation strives to meet together for weekly prayer, Bible Study, meetings, (including Student Executive Meetings each week); community and campus service projects; spring and fall retreats; fostering relationships through social events; and seeking opportunities as a group to develop leadership skills. Students also attend off campus worship services, community events, and activities sponsored by local churches. Student presence at Sunday Worship services are often dependent upon academic studies, involvement in other organizations, employment, or visiting with family on weekends.

The Campus Minister and the Wesley Foundation students are the vessels of ministry being used by God to evangelize and bring new members to Wesley Foundation at Salisbury University. Students actively participate in recruiting other students to become a part of Wesley Foundation all throughout the semester but especially during Student Activities Fairs held in the fall and spring semesters. The Spring Student Activities Fair has been and continues to be a time when the smallest number of students is recruited. However, the fall 2013 and spring 2014 recruitment effort landed a diverse group of students who have proven to be active and committed spiritual leaders. The recruitment process prompted the students and campus minister to organize a display table that would attract new students to the organization but to distribute needed resources to educate and keep students abreast of biblical materials that will enhance their spiritual development.

In the fall of 2013 and spring of 2014, Bible Study topics discussed were: Anxiety, being calm; Humility; Unconditional Love; Spending quality time with God; The Gospel; Saved from to be saved to; Unshakeable faith; Christianity 101; Heart Conditions and Bad Fruit, Good Fruit. All topics were studied in depth (as time allowed) and students shared real life experiences that related to the Bible Study topic for that particular evening. Students continue to hear other ministerial leaders; which affords them the opportunity to be more ecumenical as a Christian fellowship. A Christian resource was purchased for the students titled, "Jesus Is – Find A New Way To be Human." The book is authored by Judah Smith. Consequently, the Campus Minister and students were invited as special guests to attend the 2013 and 2014 "National Day of Prayer." This event gave them even more exposure to ecumenicalism.

Since the past Annual Conference Year, students have participated in "The Big Event" and the "I Love Salisbury" event which are volunteer events where campus organizations travel to areas around Salisbury and assist residents with small clean-up efforts. Students also participated for the first time in a "Canned Food Drive." The Wesley Foundation students and campus minister planned and implemented a workshop titled "Relationship Exposure." This workshop was held in November 2013 and gave students a foundation on which to build personal and professional relationships. Further, in December 2013, the students ended the semester by giving back to the community. They hosting an "Adopt-A-Family" project housed in the HALO Christian Shelter. Gifts were purchased and given to a particular family that may not have gifts during the Christmas season. Students enjoyed attending "The Young Adult Summit" held April 11-12, 2014 in Ocean City sponsored by The Vision Team, and Strengthening the Black Church for the 21st Century. Additionally, as a Fall Retreat opportunity, students attended the Sight & Sound Theatre to see the Gospel of Jesus come to life in the production of "Noah."

Future Wesley Foundation goals for Fall 2014 and Spring 2015 are the planning and implementing of a "Take Control of Your Finances Workshop" and "Are You Called to Ministry Night; A Revival" and in order to collaborate with the local church that is being served by the campus minister, the fifth Sunday in March has been declared "Wesley Foundation Day." A Prayer Breakfast and worship service was held. The speaker for the Prayer Breakfast was a WBOC Reporter and the former president of Wesley Foundation delivered the message at the morning worship service.

As mentioned earlier in this document, Wesley Foundation has a phenomenal Student Executive Board who has a deep passion for Christ and the work of transfiguration. The Student Executive Committee includes a President, Vice President, Public Relations Coordinator and a Hospitality Coordinator. All positions function in consultation with the Campus Minister/Executive Director. There continues to be a strong leadership presence in Wesley Foundation at Salisbury University. To God Be the Glory!

The primary goal of Wesley Foundation continues to be: To promote and establish the spiritual development of students as they maintain a relationship with Jesus Christ. Wesley Foundation will continue to witness and spread the Gospel of Jesus Christ on and off campus. As you have read, this organization is in the habit of exploring other opportunities for ministry. Additionally, Wesley Foundation at Salisbury University welcomes the opportunity to receive referrals from United Methodist congregations and other denominations as well.

WESLEY FOUNDATION CAMPUS MINISTRY UNIVERSITY OF MARYLAND EASTERN SHORE

The Wesley Foundation at the University of Maryland Eastern Shore found itself under new leadership as the Rev. Darlene Dixon, pastor of Metropolitan UMC, was appointed to serve as Director of Strengthening the Black Church and Congregational Development for the Peninsula-Delaware Conference. Rev. Ronald Bell, Sr. was appointed senior pastor and Rev. Ervin Wallace, Jr. was appointed as assistant to the pastor at Metropolitan UMC and the Wesley Foundation at UMES.

Our initial goal was to meet with the Wesley Foundation Board of Directors (BOD), and develop a ministry plan to evangelize incoming students and their families for the fall semester. With the help of the BOD and personnel from the Student Affairs & Enrollment Office, the Wesley Foundation was able to participate in UMES' First Look. First Look is an outdoor event which involves all student organizations. This event allows organizations to recruit new members and explain their mission and purpose to new students. Twenty-four students signed up at the Wesley Foundation table at this event.

At our second BOD meeting, which was held in the UMES Chapel, we invited those students who had signed up at First Look to come and meet the Wesley Foundation BOD. Our discernment from that meeting was that we needed to take the vision of our ministry to the students. In other words, rather than the students coming to us, we should go to the students.

Out of this discernment the BOD, with the help of dorm directors, we identified three dorms to offer bible study and fellowship groups. We decided to focus on one dorm at a time, so for the fall semester Murphy Hall became the mission field of our ministry. Weekly bible study was held in the lobby of Murphy Hall. Attendance ranged anywhere from 15 to 40 students each evening. Through the Tuesday evening bible study, students were invited to Sunday morning worship at Metropolitan UMC, where anywhere from 15 to 30 students attended each week. Metropolitan church van picked up students from the dining hall each Sunday and returned them to campus following the morning service.

Students participated in the ministries of Metropolitan by ushering, reading scripture, performing praise dances, singing in the choir, cleaning the church, and collecting food to give to families during the Thanksgiving season. Students also participated in UMES and Metropolitan's 127th Founders Day Service where more than 200 of UMES students, faculty and staff attended along with President Juliet Bell. In October of 2013, UMES held Parent's Day and the students and their parents were invited to attend worship on Sunday morning to which many did attend.

Goals

The goals of the Wesley Foundation for 2014 and beyond the fall semester are rooted in the vision that ministry should be taken to the students. In order to foster spiritual wellbeing and wholeness on the UMES campus the Wesley Foundation will offer the following ministries to the campus community:

- Weekly Bible Study at University Terrace.
 - Mission and Outreach Opportunities:
 - o Involve students in community service opportunities. The first event in the spring will be partnering with UMES in an Alternative Spring Break project.
 - Attend the Pen-Del Young Adult Rally.
 - Provide Spiritual Formation Opportunities:
 - o Develop a student prayer group on campus.
 - o Develop a Facebook prayer group for students, staff, faculty, and support staff.
 - Provide Worship Opportunities:
 - Provide transportation to and from Metropolitan UMC for worship and other ministry opportunities.
 - o Invite student to share their gifts and talents by including them in the worship services as liturgists, ushers, choir members, helpers and etc.
 - Maintain our United Methodist presence on the UMES Campus by participating in commencements services and other activities on campus.

2012 Narrative

Discipleship – We started the year off studying Rev. Adam Hamilton's **Christianity and World Religions** with the Lutherans, Presbyterians, and Blue Hens for Christ, during the Winter Session. It was a great time of learning and discussion about how the similarities and differences between Christianity and other faiths around the world. We hope to maintain that spirit of growth along with the spirit of connection to each other and with our God by continued study of God's word. Once the Spring Semester began, we continued our study of Acts of the Apostles. When summer started, we decided to focus on movies with theological themes, with a good mix of funny and deep. We continued with and finished Acts in the fall semester. It got a little dry during the "travel slides" portions, but amazing to see how much people did to spread the Gospel to such a hurting world. We continue to

average around 24 undergrad students, with a max of 35. We continue to provide two nights of Bible Study in order to stay in the Wesley Lounge and keep a more intimate feel. Our Grad. Group continues to meet weekly throughout the year and is shifting more into a Young Adult group. We had our 3rd annual Fall Retreat focusing on the Wesleyan Covenant Prayer at Camp Pecometh and delved into what it means to live with the attitude of "I am not my own, I am thine". Sunday Fellowships are now drawing 25+ students that continue to be fed by different "brunch angels." Because of the numbers, we try to use Memorial Lounge for our Fellowship time on Sunday mornings.

Worship – We have some students who attend the liturgical services, but most worship in the SonSpirit service. There are 2 students in the praise band; and a couple in the choir too. The people of Newark UMC continue to be on the hunt for college students and help new ones find their way to the Wesley Lounge to be included. Wesley students continue to lead in worship as liturgists. Wesley Sunday was a great success involving 22 students who conducted all 4 services with a full choir, wind ensemble, and praise band of students. We hope to have the opportunity to repeat the service for other churches throughout the conference. Let us know if you would like to have a Wesley Worship service at your church.

Social and Outreach Activities – We never run out of ways to have a good time. Our social events like apple picking, games on the Green, a Halloween Party, Pinterest Party, and End of Semester Movie Night remind students that they can have fun without alcohol being involved. They vary in attendance from 8 to 25, but are always greatly appreciated. Our End of Semester Movie Night and exam survival bags continue to attract a large group each year. We hope that our participation at the Youth Rally will allow students to connect with a campus ministry wherever they go to college, and remind youth leaders that campus ministry should be the next logical step in their youth's faith journey.

Missions – We continue to find ways to serve in our local community each year, whether it's supporting a worthy cause, or helping those in need through community clean ups and visiting a local nursing home. This past year a group of 26 headed to Crisfield, MD to help with Hurricane Sandy Relief. We fixed walls, cleaned a donated church building that will become housing for future teams, fixed flooring, drudged out old insulation, and spent a lot of time underneath buildings. For 2014 we are heading down to Aurora, NC to help with Hurricane relief (the storms before hurricane Sandy).

Pastoral Role – As the Campus Pastor, the students and campus community are my congregation. I participate and assist in leadership in the University Religious Leaders Organization. I am "Mary the Methodist" when promoting campus ministry for official U. D. events. Requests for counseling from students and parents continue to increase. These students are dealing with a great number of issues. I have helped students address issues with family, depression, alcohol, sexual boundaries, break ups, time management, and self-esteem. Basically, all stresses that come from maturing, and becoming a Christian adult. I have also had the privilege to participate in some Wesley weddings this summer. We have other Wesley weddings to look forward to in the next couple of years as well.

Renewing our Foundation – Newark UMC continues to graciously house us, and have been renovating the building, including a new heating system for the front sections of the building. This affected the Wesley Lounge, and so for the first 6 weeks of the fall semester, we had our activities in Memorial Lounge when we could to maintain our level of activity even if we were not in our own space. We are back in the Wesley Lounge, and have been able to update with our own SINK! Woo hoo! Also, the Executive Director's office has a new floor and new paint! Come check it out!

To Sum up – We continue the attitude of always being open for one more, and being a well watched flock of believers. We hope and pray that this Christ centered spirit of the group continues to attract new students to experience God's love and grace in the midst of a great group of people. Each year brings a new crop of students who want to grow in their faith and love of God.
