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YOUNG PEOPLE'S MINISTRY

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There are two components that make up Young People's Ministries within the Peninsula-Delaware Conference. YPM covers young people and its ministries throughout our conference and it is split between youth (12-18) and young adult (18-35). Our youth ministry piece is supported by the work of our Conference Council on Youth Ministries (CCYM), which is comprised of students and adult advisors from each of our four districts.

Our Young Adult Ministry will be forming a council over the next year that will closely resemble the CCYM but will require less oversight. It will be aptly named The Conference Council on Young Adult Ministry (CCYAM).

The CCYM works hard to help support and build up youth ministry in our annual conference and kindles the spiritual growth of the students and churches through leadership development and events.

Youth Rally:

2014 continued the success of our Youth Rally Event with "Ransomed", which was held at the Roland Powell Convention Center in Ocean City Maryland January 9-11. Over 4000 people participated this year. We had a diverse line-up this year that included: Rev. Tiffany Knowlin and George Dennehy who were our speakers; for King and Country, Jamie Grace, and The Digital Age blessed us with song; and Joe Castillo amazed us with his creative storytelling through sand art. Saturday mornings offering totaled \$8, 303.36 and was divided between the Youth Service Fund and The A21 Campaign to end human trafficking.

Mission:

Through the <u>Youth Service Fund</u> we were able to support two local churches in 2014:
Asbury UMC Harrington and Ewell's-St. Paul UMC in Clayton. The Youth Service Fund

We are also continuing with the <u>1-Day Service Project</u> after being such a great event last year. We made some changes to make this event a youth and young adult ministry. This year we served at Cape Henlopen State Park where we helped in beach and trail cleanup, rebuilding of the Piping plover Fencing, removed invasive species, and celebrated in worship to our God who made the land and the seas.

is used to help aid new youth ministry goals and ideas in the local church.

The <u>Hope Moves Mission Initiative</u> is in the process of being planned for ongoing mission opportunities outside of the country. The vision is for one youth sponsored from every church in our conference to be in mission in our world over a continuous period of time. This means that over 400 youth will make an impact in our world.

• Leadership Development:

We are continuing to set up district meetings to meet with our youth leaders/workers to recognize the need in their communities and then implement a plan of action. Each community is different so there is not just "one-way" to youth ministry.

<u>The Well</u>, held in two locations, on October 12th was a great leadership-training event where we offered youth and young adult training at both locations.

• Internship Program

Our internship program is running well for Young People's Ministry. This past year we were blessed to have Ms. Joy Gordy-Stith as our intern. Joy helped in several projects and events throughout the year. Her vibrancy and tireless enthusiasm filled

the conference office with delight. She will continue her studies at Wesley College in Dover Delaware and we look forward to Joy continuing to answer the call into ministry on her life.

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Beginning August 1, 2014, Young People's Ministry will have a new intern, Mr. Carlos Reyes Rodriguez. Carlos is currently a student at Wesley Theological Seminary working towards his MDiv. This is a great opportunity for Young People's Ministry because it shows that we are also dedicated to young people who are entering the ministry. The internship will be Carlos' Practice in Ministry and Mission requirement for Wesley and Carlos will be the first Hispanic/Latino intern for YPM. Carlos will be available for preaching at local churches throughout our conference and will be looking forward to meeting everyone in the near future. Carlos first event/project will be a Christian soccer camp in the Wilmington District in August 2014.

419 STRENGHTENING THE BLACK CHURCH

Strengthening The Black Church (STBC) for the 21st Century continues to utilize the theme **W.I.N.S.** as the plan of action in the approach for revitalization of churches. This three-day training highlights restoring ones spirit and underscores the worship experience. This opportunity is made available to both clergy and laity within our conference. This event provides for the participants a time to get back to the basics in their spirituality.

Another annual initiative for STBC is the joint sponsorship of the two-day retreat known as *The Young Adult Summit* and the annual *STBC Barbeque*. These occurrences focus on engaging and empowering our young adults between the ages of 18-35. In 2013, the barbeque took place in Salisbury at the Park. There was music, food, fellowship and fun. The two-day retreat took place in Ocean City. Therefore, the committee which consists of laity and clergy are intentional in finding ways to support and resource our local congregations and clergy serving in such capacities in order to bridge our understanding of diversity. Moreover, the success of our cr/cc appointments will depend primarily upon the level of intra-support from the connectional system.

This year the committee:

- 1. Provided bibliographies for clergy and congregations to use as learning tools.
- 2. Contacted clergy persons newly appointed in cr/cc context to offer insights that would be helpful in their context.
- 3. Contacted SPRC committees to dialogue and offer assistance.
- 4. Provided a one-day training for newly appointed clergy with Rev. Varlyna Wright, DS of the Greater New Jersey Conference.
- 5. Agreed to be part of Rev. Wright's efforts to create a model for future use in cc/cr appointments.

Our goal this year is to identify congregations and clergy persons that have the potential of developing a multi-cultural congregations, explore the possibility of providing coaches for clergy members, and lead conversation regarding compensation for clergy serving in such capacity, lead open and honest dialogue in local congregations to improve our understanding of diversity, and continue our present support and resourcing for clergy and congregations.

As the conference continues to embrace diversity, it's imperative to be intentional in finding ways to bridge our lack of understanding between cultures and races. 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PECOMETH CAMP & RETREAT MINISTRIES

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REVIEW OF 2013 GOALS

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Reach 20% occupancy (as measured in user days/bed) at the Riverview Retreat Center for the 2013 calendar year.

The Riverview Retreat Center (RRC) reached an occupancy rate of 20.02% in 2013, up from 16% in 2012 (Note: the occupancy rate is based on beds, not rooms. The RRC capacity is 48 beds and the occupancy rate is based on 350 days/year). In total, the RRC served 1659 guests, for a total of 3562 guest nights and 9892 meals.

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In addition, Pecometh continues to developing programming to help our churches develop principled Christian leaders for the church and the world. These include:

- Winter and Summer Silent Retreats
- Re:View Confirmation Retreat
- A Voice of the Heart-Clergy Spiritual Formation Retreat
- Summer Kick-Off-Youth Group Pool Party and Cookout*
- Batman Youth Ministry Training
- Directors' Leadership Week*
 - Single-Parent Family Retreat
 - River of Life-Senior Adult Retreat
 - Incorporation and Risk Management Basics
 - Fall Bonfire and Hayride for Youth Groups*
 - Clergy Taxes

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*These programs were offered in partnership with Young Peoples Ministries

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Pecometh continues to grow as a significant resource to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. These include hosting church retreats, Walk to Emmaus, Chrysalis, Deaf Camp, Nurturing Wholeness, Advocacy Resource Team, CARE Team and the Board of Ordained Ministry.

Register 1300 campers in the Pecometh Camp Programs.

Camp Pecometh served 1312 persons in 2013, an increase of 7.4% over 2012. The breakdown of camp registrations is as follows:

- 867 overnight campers
- 175 day campers
- 114 School's Out, We're In campers
- 156 Friends and Family campers

This does reflect a continuing shift away from overnight camps. In part, this is an indication of a change in cultural norms, where parents are more reluctant to allow their children to be away from home under the supervision of others. This also is directly correlated to the decline in the number of children and youth served by our churches.

Develop a donor base of 2750 persons/organizations with \$140,000 in contributions to the annual fund, camperships and capital projects (excluding the capital campaign).

Pecometh's donor base has grown to over 2,700 donors as of the end of 2013. Total giving, excluding the Capital Campaign, was \$123,870 as follows:

Pecometh granted \$29,500 in camperships to 151 campers in 2013. In addition, the Spain Grant Program, which works with churches who are ministry with those in financial need, sponsored 76 campers with \$15,410 in support. This is an increase from 23 campers in 2012.

CAMPING AND RETREAT MINISTRIES
